

these camps that the average time of survival is only 3 years.

Famine and hardship continue to force many North Koreans to flee across the porous border to China. This is very dangerous, but many find refuge in churches while in China. There they hear the Gospel and accept Christ as their Saviour. Christians who find their way back to North Korea smuggle Bibles and share their faith discretely with those in whom they can confide.

On one occasion a 17-year-old boy fled to China and found the Lord. He returned to North Korea with rice and two copies of the Bible hidden in his backpack.

He was caught by a soldier as he tried to cross the border under the cover of darkness. The soldier tried to read them but it was dark, so he left the boy on the ground and took the books over to a small observation hut.

As he and another soldier started to read, the boy saw his chance to escape. The last thing he saw as he looked over his shoulder was two soldiers eagerly reading his Bibles.

Pray for wisdom and protection for those who smuggle Bibles into North Korea and China. Pray also for the necessary finances to meet this tremendous need. What a joy and a blessing it is to provide those in need with the precious Word of God!

Japan Mission continues to make Bibles available for distribution in North Korea. Recent reports from various ministry partners who travelled to the country indicate that there are signs of major changes ahead.

North Korea remains one of the most difficult countries in the world in which to be a Christian. Brothers and sisters in Christ hide their faith due to the threat of severe persecution. They cannot openly pray, sing or profess to be followers of Jesus Christ.

Owning even a small portion of the Bible in North Korea means risking one's life. Offenders face a sentence of up to 15 years in a prison camp. Conditions are so bad in
